I News

Complex customs paperwork and red tape leading to critical import export disruption

 Britain's manufacturers are calling on the Government to move immediately to work with our European partners to find an urgent solution to the current long border delays caused by complex paperwork, on the back of a major survey showing that 60% of companies are experiencing significant disruption since January 1st.



Make UK research further revealed that some **61% of businesses are further enduring supply chain disruption** either importing or exporting to and from the EU and 32% are having their supply chains impacted in both directions. Companies are also struggling to prove the UK origin of their goods in order to qualify for zero tariff access.

Customs paperwork urgently needs to be simplified on both sides of the border, so it can be completed and checked quickly before haulage journeys begin and companies can be reassured that their goods have a clear run to the end customer. The increase in paperwork and red tape at the borders has led to substantial delays for trucks, with many left stranded across the Continent because of incorrect paperwork. Many businesses have already taken the hard decision to put a hold on importing and exporting from the EU in a hope that things improve, but this is having a serious commercial impact on companies already struggling to survive the current COVID crisis.

Government should fast track the training of good quality customs agents to smooth the flow at the border. In tandem, exporters and hauliers should be encouraged by Government to work with industry to smooth out the current problems as much as possible.

Additional red tape is also being heaped on business as they struggle to prove origin of their goods to qualify for zero tariffs. Some companies are finding the burden of proving origin so onerous, they are choosing to pay the tariffs rather than spend the additional time and money attempting to qualify for tariff free access, with serious financial ramifications.

Bank of England forecasts rapid economic recovery in 2021

2. The Covid pandemic continues to hit business activity and household spending in the UK and the rest of the world. Restrictions put in place to contain the pandemic's spread are causing many businesses to sell less of their goods and services. Some businesses are unable to sell at all. Even though the available evidence shows that current restrictions are affecting economic activity less severely than restrictions did during the first lockdown—the GDP of the South West was 19.1% lower in the second quarter of 2020 than in the first— it's clear from my conversations with contacts that businesses in the region are still feeling immense strain.



Many households have a lot less money to spend, too. Although the Government's employment-support schemes are significantly limiting the rise in unemployment, some people have lost their jobs. The latest data available show the unemployment rate in the South West was 4.1% in September-November 2020, up from 2.8% in the same period in 2019. And we think further rises in unemployment are likely over the first half of this year.

To help get businesses and households through these tough times, the Bank of England has taken prompt and substantial action. Last year, the Bank's Monetary Policy Committee (MPC) cut Bank Rate—the base rate that many short-term interest rates are linked to—to a record low of 0.1%. The

MPC also announced it would inject an additional £450 billion into the economy through quantitative easing (QE). QE pushes long-term interest rates down. Lower short- and long-term interest rates mean cheaper loans and mortgages for businesses and households. At its meeting in February, the MPC decided to keep Bank Rate at 0.1% and the total amount of QE, including the amount announced last year, at £895 billion. And the MPC said it does not intend to either raise Bank Rate or reduce QE until there is clear evidence that the economy is making significant progress towards a full recovery and inflation is returning sustainably to target.

The MPC's latest forecasts show the UK economy recovering rapidly later this year, with the vaccination programme leading to the easing of restrictions and people's health concerns. The expected recovery is supported by the substantial actions already announced by the Bank and the Government. In terms of total activity and spending, the economy will probably get back to where it was before the pandemic in around a year's time.

As activity and spending recover, and given recent developments in energy prices, inflation is expected to rise back to our 2% target over the next year.

But the future path of the economy remains unusually uncertain—we can't be sure how the pandemic will develop, how governments across the world will loosen or tighten restrictions, or how households and businesses will react to those changes. The MPC is monitoring the situation closely and stands ready to take any further action necessary to support the economy and get inflation back to target. In this context of unusual uncertainty, the intelligence that I and my fellow Agents are gathering for the MPC from our contacts in the South West and the rest of the UK is especially vital.

With our contacts' help, the Bank of England will continue to maintain price and financial stability on behalf of the people of the UK.



New FE Skills White Paper published by Government


- 3. The Government's new further education white paper *Skills for Jobs: Lifelong learning for opportunity* and growth was published in January. In it, it says that, 'We will ensure employers are at the heart of Post-16 skills, driving technical and higher technical skills provision in their areas. To do this we will:
 - Give employers a central role working with further education colleges, other providers, and local stakeholders to develop new Local Skills Improvement Plans which shape technical skills provision so that it meets local labour market needs.
 - Pilot Local Skills Improvement Plans in Trailblazer local areas, exploring an approach where they are led by accredited Chambers of Commerce and other business representative organisations in collaboration with local providers; and engage employer and provider groups to ensure we create the most effective models of employer representation before wider rollout.
 - Make Strategic Development Funding available in 2021/22 in a number of pilot areas to support colleges to reshape their provision to address local priorities that have been agreed with local employers.
 - Ensure government has up-to-date and expert advice on the labour market and national skills gaps from the Skills and Productivity Board.
 - Align the substantial majority of post-16 technical and higher technical education and training to employer-led standards set by the Institute for Apprenticeships and Technical Education, so skills provision meets skills need.
 - Continue to improve and grow apprenticeships, so more employers and individuals can benefit from them as part of the Lifetime Skills Guarantee.
 - Invite proposals through the Strategic Development Fund to establish College Business Centres within further education colleges to work with employers in a designated sector on business development and innovation'.

4. Plymouth has, once again, maintained its title as the English southern city with the highest concentration of its workforce employed in manufacturing. At 12.4 per cent, it remains well ahead of its nearest rivals Portsmouth and Swindon (at 9.4% and 8.4% respectively). Nationally, Plymouth ranks 12th English city behind top five: Burnley, Derby, Telford, Blackburn and Sunderland. (Statistics courtesy of the *Centre for Cities – Cities Outlook 2021*).

'Brexit-buying' and port issues lead to stockpiling and supply-chain disruption at UK manufacturers

5. The upturn in the UK manufacturing sector slowed sharply at the start of 2021. Output growth eased and new orders fell slightly as producers faced weaker inflows of new export work and temporary supply-chain disruptions caused by COVID-19 restrictions and transport delays (especially at ports) following the end of the Brexit transition period.

The seasonally adjusted IHS Markit/CIPS Purchasing Managers' Index® (PMI®) fell to a three-month low of 54.1 in January,



down from December's three-year high of 57.5. Declining new order intakes and a steep reduction in input stocks both weighed on the PMI level.

The main positive influence on the PMI was a marked lengthening of supplier lead times, which (apart from April 2020) was the greatest registered in the near 30-year survey history. Although this is usually a signal of stronger demand resulting from economic growth, the recent trend in vendor performance has mainly reflected supply-chain disruptions caused by COVID-19 restrictions and the end of the Brexit transition period.

Manufacturing output increased for the eighth successive month in January. However, the rate of expansion slowed to its joint-weakest during that sequence, as total new order intakes fell slightly due to lower intakes of new export business. Companies reported that the national lockdown, end of the Brexit transition period, client closures and renewed uncertainty at the start of the year all contributed to the decrease in new orders. 
Coronavirus (COVID-19) cases in Plymouth

Government boost to rapid workplace testing

An online portal has been launched to make it even easier for business in the private sector to get involved and find out more about offering rapid testing in the workplace. Business that are open during lockdown can now sign up to rapid testing programmes that identify cases of Covid-19 in employees who are not showing symptoms, to help stop the spread of Covid-19, and ensure vital public and economic services can continue. Businesses can register to order coronavirus rapid lateral flow tests for employees if:

- Your business is registered in England
- You employ 50 people or more
- Your employees cannot work from home

Testing is key to breaking the chains of transmission. Around one in three people who have coronavirus have no symptoms and may be unknowingly spreading the virus. This expansion of testing will find more positive cases, keeping workers who cannot work from home unknowingly passing on the virus and protecting vital public services. Bounce Back Loan – new payment flexibilities

<u>Bounce Back Loan</u> borrowers will now have the option to tailor payments according to their individual circumstances. <u>Pay as You Grow repayment flexibilities</u> now provide businesses with the following options to:

- Extend the length of the loan from six years to ten
- Make interest-only payments for six months, with the option to use this up to three times throughout the loan
- Pause repayments entirely for up to six months

The scheme is open to applications until 31 March 2021. <u>Apply for a coronavirus Bounce Back Loan</u>. Find out how to pay VAT payments deferred between 20 March and 30 June 2020

You can pay now or get ready to join the VAT deferral new payment scheme. The new scheme lets you pay your deferred VAT in equal instalments, interest free and choose the number of instalments, from 2 to 11 (depending on when you join). Find out more <u>here</u>.

Government announces NEW £20 million SME Brexit Support Fund

The £20 million SME Brexit Support Fund, offers support to help small businesses adjust to new customs procedures, rules of origin, and VAT rules when trading with the EU.

Eligibility: The SME Brexit Support Fund could give you up to £2,000 if your business has up to 500 employees, and no more than £100 million annual turnover.

SMEs who trade only with the EU, and are therefore new to importing and exporting processes, can apply for grants of up to £2,000, to pay for practical support including training and professional advice to ensure they can continue trading effectively with the EU.

New rules for businesses

- You must declare any goods you send to the EU, providing details about what you're sending and what it's
 worth, using a customs declaration form. You can get a <u>customs intermediary</u> to help you do this.
- If you're sending goods using a fast parcel operator or express courier, they'll declare the goods for you, using the information you provide. This option could be beneficial for smaller businesses who aren't looking to get a contract with a customs agent.
- o If you're sending **goods by post valued at £900** or less, Royal Mail will give you a customs declaration sticker to fill in and attach to the parcel. For goods worth more than £900, Royal Mail will submit the customs declaration for you, using the information you provide.
- You will need an Export Health Certificate (EHC) to export food or drink that contains products of animal
 origin such as meat, dairy or eggs.

Rules of Origin for trading with the EU: A short explainer for SMEs

What are Rules of Origin?

Rules of Origin determine the economic nationality of a good under a Free Trade Agreement (FTA). Businesses need to know about them because the UK-EU <u>Trade and Cooperation Agreement</u> (TCA) means they can trade with the EU without paying tariffs – but only if their product meets the relevant Rules of Origin.

How do Rules of Origin impact my business?

To export tariff-free into the EU, traders must check their goods meet the Rules of Origin requirements set out in the UK-EU <u>Trade and Cooperation Agreement</u> and have the right documentation. If your goods do not meet the Rules of Origin, they may face a tariff upon export to the EU.

What action do I need to take?

Then, if you are a UK exporter and your EU importer wants to claim zero tariffs on your goods, there are 3 key steps to work out whether your goods comply with rules of origin:

- 1. Classify your good every good has a commodity code and a list is available on gov.uk
- 2. Understand whether your good meets the <u>applicable rule of origin</u> from the TCA (*Chapter 2 as well as Annexes ORIG-1 to ORIG-4 will be most useful*). You can also use the <u>export checker tool</u> to find out what rule of origin applies to your exports.
- 3. Understand how to demonstrate origin to the customs authorities.

HMRC answer Frequently Asked Questions on New Trade rules

New rules for businesses that trade with Europe are here. Now that the Brexit transition period has ended, all businesses that move goods between Great Britain and countries in the EU, or under the Northern Ireland Protocol, must follow new customs and tax rules since 1 January 2021. HMRC have provided answers to some of the most frequently asked questions on the new trade rules.



1. Customs processes are complicated. Who can help me complete them?

Most traders find that they need specialist support to help with importing from or exporting to the EU. For instance, you might decide to <u>use a customs intermediary</u>.

A customs intermediary is someone who makes customs declarations for you or your business. This could be:

- a freight forwarder a company that helps their clients move cargo globally, including supporting the customs process
- o a customs agent or broker these make sure your goods clear through customs.

If you decide to use an intermediary, make sure you approach them as soon as possible, as there is high demand for these services. You can find a <u>list of businesses that can help</u> on GOV.UK.

There are still specific actions you will need to take if you get an intermediary to help you with your customs declarations. You will:

- o be responsible for paying any taxes or duties owed;
- be responsible for providing details about your transactions to your chosen intermediary;
- need to apply for an Economic Operator Registration and Identification (EORI) number (if you don't
 already have one). An intermediary can't apply for an EORI on your behalf and they will need this to
 complete your customs declarations. You can <u>register for free</u> on GOV.UK. It takes 5 to 10 minutes to
 apply and you will normally receive it in under a week.

2. My business is located in the United Kingdom and I export goods to EU customers, can you explain how I should account for VAT?

If you sell, send or transfer goods out of the UK you do not normally need to charge VAT on them in the UK. You can zero-rate most exports from:

- Great Britain to a destination outside the UK
- o Northern Ireland to a destination outside the UK and EU.

If you incorrectly charge UK VAT on exports of goods, your customers may also have to pay VAT in the country where the goods are imported.

Different rules may apply in different countries. Therefore, it's important that you understand the import VAT rules of each EU country that you sell to.

3. I send goods from the United Kingdom to my customers in the EU, has anything changed about how I should account for VAT?

Yes. Previously, before the end of the transition period:

- VAT was due on the goods that you sold to your EU customers. If your EU customer was not VAT registered themselves (for example, because they were a private individual) you accounted for UK VAT in the UK. If your sales to EU customers breached an annual distance selling threshold you had to register for VAT in that EU Member State and account for EU VAT in that country.
- o If your EU customer was registered for VAT in their own country your business zero-rated the sale as a 'dispatch' and your EU customer accounted for the VAT as an 'acquisition' in their own country.

Now, following the end of the transition period:

- o if you are a business subject to the Northern Ireland protocol, the above rules will still apply.
- if you are a business moving goods from Great Britain to the EU, your goods should be zero-rated exports from the UK and import VAT will be due to be collected from the EU recipient at import into the EU and subject to EU rules.
- o different rules may apply in different countries therefore, it's important that you understand the import VAT rules of each EU country that you sell to.

Trade

Moving goods

Do you move goods to Northern Ireland?

This year, as we mark the centenary of Northern Ireland, we need no reminder about its integral place within our United Kingdom. Our trade deal with the EU and the additional agreement known as the Northern Ireland Protocol has safeguarded Northern Ireland's place in the UK's customs territory. We have also preserved unfettered access for Northern Ireland traders moving goods into Great Britain, removing the need for export declarations. However, there are changes to the way goods move between Great Britain and Northern Ireland.

Many businesses have adjusted quickly to these new requirements but I recognise that some traders are still adapting. The Government is committed to providing you with the support you need as your work continues. We have set up two services to help you:

- Trader Support Service (TSS): This free UK Government-backed service will guide you through any changes
 you need to make, and can complete customs declarations on your behalf. The TSS also offers a
 comprehensive range of education materials including online training, webinars and "how to" guides.
- Movement Assistance Scheme (MAS): Free support, including a dedicated helpline, is available for traders and businesses moving animals, plants and associated products from Great Britain to Northern Ireland.
 MAS also means that traders will not need to pay health certification costs, which will be met by the UK Government.

I know that many of you were waiting for this, and that some of our employers had been getting rather impatient with the wait. I would give a word of caution re the time delay between an employer registering and receiving the incentive payment(s) — might be worth providers not raising expectations with employers on them receiving a quick turnaround.




